

Anne De Biasi, MHA (2000-2001) is the Director of Child Health Policy and Advocacy, directing corporate advocacy and establishing a DC-based policy office for Nemours, a child health system and operating foundation with a mission of improving the health of all children.

From 2006-2008 Anne was Director of Public Policy at the National Breast Cancer Coalition (NBCC), responsible for developing and implementing public policy and legislative initiatives, including NBCC's number one public policy priority, guaranteed access to quality health care for all. During Anne's tenure federal funding for breast cancer research was increased by \$22.5 million and, after 10 years of lobbying, the Breast Cancer and Environmental Research Act was enacted.

From 2001 to 2005, Anne was the Washington (DC) Director of the Children's Dental Health Project (CDHP), a nonprofit organization that advances policies to improve children's oral health. In 2006, she was a consultant to the Institute of Medicine's Office of Health Policy Fellowships and Programs.

Anne was a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow (2000-2001), serving as Health Legislative Aide to the US Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle. She subsequently served on his health staff. In these roles, she worked directly with the two primary Senate health committees: the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee and the Finance Committee. Legislation she worked on includes the Patients Bill of Rights, Genetic Non-Discrimination in Health Insurance and the Workplace Act, Nurse Reinvestment Act, rural emergency medical services legislation and the Access to Medical Treatment Act.

Anne was the President and Chief Executive Officer of Oak Orchard Community Health Center in upstate New York from 1996 to 2000. She worked in migrant and community health centers for 7 years, in both urban and rural areas, and served on the Board of the Community Healthcare Association of New York State (CHANYS).

Anne graduated with Distinction from the University of Virginia where she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and as valedictorian of the Medical College of Virginia's Masters Program in Health Administration. She is an active volunteer, holding leadership positions in community organizations and churches. Anne is also an instructor in health policy for Stanford University. She is currently on the board of a foundation focused on education and health care. Anne is a graduate of Leadership Rochester and was recognized with a "40 under 40 Award" from the Rochester Business Journal.
